- Rural areas have problems in attracting and retaining primary care workforce. This might have consequences for the existing workforce.
- In rural areas, GPs work more hours and provide more medical procedures to their patients.
- Apart from these differences between locations, overall ageing of the GP population is evident.
- Dedicated human resource policies for rural areas are required with a view to an ageing GP population, to the individual preferences and needs of the GPs, and to decreasing attractiveness of rural areas.

- Workforce issues are the biggest challenge, person centred planning and delivery is the antidote.
- Radical and disruptive approaches which put more emphasis on primary care, multiagency working and community ownership, in an environment which accommodates at least some appetite for risk are important.

 The agreed definition highlight five major dimensions: 'Medical deserts are areas where population healthcare needs are unmet partially or totally due to lack of adequate access or improper quality of healthcare services caused by (i) insufficient human resources in health or (ii) facilities, (iii) long waiting times, (iv) disproportionate high costs of services or (v) other socio-cultural barriers'.
